

Suburban Community Hospital Community Health Needs Assessment Implementation Strategy Fiscal years FY 2017 - 2020

Suburban Community Hospital completed a comprehensive Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) that was adopted by the Board of Directors in September 2017. Suburban Community Hospital performed the CHNA in adherence with certain federal requirements for not-for-profit hospitals set forth in the Affordable Care Act and by the Internal Revenue Service. The assessment took into account input from representatives of the community, community members, and various community organizations.

Hospital Information and Mission Statement

Suburban Community Hospital is a not-for-profit, acute care hospital, and a member of the Prime Healthcare Foundation, a 501(c)(3) public charity. For over 65 years, Suburban Community Hospital has been delivering quality healthcare to Montgomery County and the surrounding region.

Suburban Community Hospital is located in East Norriton Township in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. The hospital's service area (2015 Population 205,910) was defined as the community. The service area includes the following zip codes in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania: 19401, 19403, 19408, 19422, 19428, 19462, 19405, 19406, 19426, and 19446. The total population of the service area is predicted to increase to approximately 210,909 residents in 2020. Under one-quarter of residents are between the ages of 0-17 (22%), more than one-third are 18-44 (36%), nearly three-in-ten are 45-64 (27%), and 14% are 65 or older. Approximately 49% of the service area's population is male and 51% is female. Nearly three-quarters of residents of the service area are Caucasian (70%), one- tenth are African-American (11%), 8% are Asian, 9% are Latino. The overwhelming majority of residents in the service area speak English at home (84%), 5% speak an Asian language, 6% speak Spanish, and 6% speak another language.

Five percent (5%) of families without children and 8% of families with children are living in poverty in the service area. The median household income in the service area is \$81,276, an increase from 2013 when it was \$76,709. Norristown community members described the Borough of Norristown as a higher need area due to a higher poverty rate. The median household income in the service area is comparable to that of Montgomery County, and substantially higher than that of Pennsylvania as a whole.

Mission

To deliver compassionate, quality care to patients and better healthcare to communities.

Health Needs of the Community

The CHNA conducted in 2017 identified nine significant health needs within the Suburban Community Hospital community. Those needs were then prioritized based on a review and a Nominal Group Planning Method that involved ranking of the needs and group discussion that focused on prevalence, severity, available data, magnitude of persons affected, and the ability of the hospital to impact the need. The nine significant health needs identified, in order of priority include:

Community Need	Definition	Significant Findings
Late prenatal care	Receiving pre-natal care during the first trimester of pregnancy can help ensure that health concerns are identified and addressed in a timely manner.	 One-third (33%) of women in the Suburban Community Hospital service area receive prenatal care beginning after the first trimester or receive no prenatal care. This percentage does not meet the Healthy People 2020 goal of 22%. The percentage in the SCH service area is higher than the percentage in Montgomery County (26%), and similar to the percentage in SEPA (36%). The majority of Latina (65%) and Black women (54%) in the service area receive late prenatal care or none at all. o This is more than two to three times the percentage of White women (22%) and Asian women (27%) who receive late or no prenatal care.
Poor nutrition and obesity	Overweight and obesity are strongly correlated with high blood pressure, diabetes, cancer, heart disease, and asthma.	 Nearly one-third of service area adults age 20 and over (31%) are obese, and a similar proportion are overweight (32%).11 This represents approximately 102,000 adults who are overweight or obese in the Suburban Community Hospital service area. The percentage of obese adults in the service area (31%) is very similar to the Healthy People 2020 goal of 31% obesity in adults. Adults in the service area are less likely to be obese or overweight (31% and 32%, respectively) than adults in Montgomery County as a whole (38% and 36%, respectively). About 5,600 children in the service area (19%) are classified as obese, and 13% are overweight. The percentage of obese children (19%) does not meet the Healthy People 2020 goal for obesity in children, which is 15%. A similar percentage of children in the SEPA region (21%).

Serious mental illness in adults and children	Mental illness	 Approximately 24,600 adults in the service area, 15%, have been diagnosed with a mental health condition at some point in their lifetime. Of those with a mental health condition, the majority (61%) are not receiving treatment for the condition. According to one focus group participant, there is a stigma against mental health patients, particularly in Norristown, where many treatment programs are located. This makes it difficult to create more treatment options. According to five key informants and focus group participants, there are several problems with the mental health system: Not enough providers, although 16 inpatient beds have been added in the county recently; There is a cultural stigma against receiving mental health care; Patients fear a loss of confidentiality; There is a gap in treatment between the Emergency Room and providers; and Treatment may be too costly for many patients. About 10% of adults age 60 and older in the Suburban Community Hospital service area, or 4,300 individuals, report speaking to friends or relatives less than once a week. This may be an indicator of social isolation and is a higher proportion than socially isolated older adults in Montgomery County (6%) and is similar to the proportion in SEPA as a whole (6%).
Infant mortality in Norristown Borough	Mortality	 Every year, an average of 16 infants living in the Suburban Community Hospital service area dies before their first birthday. The SCH service area infant mortality rate is 6 infant deaths per 1,000 live births. The Suburban Community Hospital service area's infant mortality rate (6 per 1,000 live births) meets the Healthy People 2020 goal of 6 infant deaths per 1,000 live births. The infant mortality rate in the SCH service area (6 per 1,000 live births) is similar to the rate for SEPA as a whole (7 per 1,000 live births) and to the rate for Montgomery County (5 per 1,000 live births). However, the infant mortality rate in Norristown Borough (10 per 1,000 live births; representing 34 infant deaths during 2011-2015) is higher than the Healthy People 2020 goal of 6.

Opioid addiction	Addiction	Substance abuse, particularly prescription and non- prescription opiate addiction, is one of the top problems in Montgomery County, including the hospital service area. The County is making great strides in dealing with this problem, particularly with NARCAN distribution and use to reverse drug overdoses. However, too many addicts are being seen in the hospital Emergency Room because there are too few providers and a stigma both against treating substance abusers and being identified as an addict
Smoking	Cancer/Tobacco Use	 Among deaths due to cancer, lung cancer has the highest mortality rate (41 per 100,000 population: representing an average of 93 deaths annually). These rates are similar to rates in Montgomery County but lower than in the SEPA region as a whole. Lung cancer rates in the Suburban Community Hospital area (41 deaths per 100,000 population) meet the Healthy People 2020 goal for lung cancer (46 deaths per 100,000 population) In the Suburban Community Hospital service area, 13% of adults smoke cigarettes. This represents approximately 20,500 adults. This is significantly lower (p<.01) than the percentage of smokers in the remainder of Montgomery County (17%), and almost meets the Healthy People 2020 goal of 12%. The percentage of smokers in the service area is lower than in SEPA as a whole (16%), and similar to Montgomery County (12%). Within the service area, 55% of smokers have tried to quit during the past year. This is higher than in Montgomery County (53%) but does not meet the Healthy People 2020 goal of 80% of smokers trying to quit.

- o Dental Care

This implementation strategy specifies community health needs that the Hospital has determined to meet in whole or in part and that are consistent with its mission. The Hospital reserves the right to amend this implementation strategy as circumstances warrant. For example, certain needs may become more pronounced and require enhancements to the described strategic initiatives. During the three years ending FY 2020, other organizations in the community may decide to address certain needs, indicating that the Hospital then should refocus its limited resources to best serve the community.
